Scriptural Reading

When **Abram** was <u>ninety-nine years old</u>, the LORD appeared to him and said, "I am God Almighty; walk before me and be <u>blameless</u>." (Genesis 17:1 NIV)

"I will confirm **my covenant** between me and you and will greatly increase your numbers." (Genesis 17:2 NIV)

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Scriptural Reading

Abram fell facedown, and God said to him, "As for me, this is **my covenant** with you: <u>You will be the father of many nations</u>." (Genesis 17:3–4 NIV)

"No longer will you be called Abram; your name will be **Abraham**, for I have made you a father of many nations." (Genesis 17:3–5 NIV)

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Scriptural Reading

"I will make you **very fruitful**; I will make nations of you, and kings will come from you." (Genesis 17:6 NIV)

"I will establish **my covenant** as an <u>everlasting</u> <u>covenant between me and you</u> and your descendants after you for the generations to come, to be your God and the God of your descendants after you." (Genesis 17:7 NIV)

You may <u>uncover</u> exciting facts about your **family background** or discover that your **ancestors** are <u>not</u> the people you thought they were.



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DNA Test

A few years ago, I took one of these **DNA tests** as I needed help in tracing my **McCowan ancestors**.

All I knew was that the McCowans came to **Kentucky** from Pennsylvania early in the 19th Century.

And that we were <u>probably</u> of **Scottish** or **Scot/Irish** origins.



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DNA Test


What I found out by sending my DNA samples to

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DNA Test

The point of all of this is that **deep inside** each of us we all have a recording of who we are and who we belong to.

You can't necessarily see it, but it is there and it reveals a lot about us and our ancestors.



Abraham

The book of **Genesis** also contains <u>reliable</u> and <u>important</u> information about our ancestors in the faith, **Abraham and Sarah**.

For Jews being <u>related</u> to Abraham is what made them special as **God's children**.

No wonder it was a major blow to their **ethnic pride**, when it was discovered God had <u>other children</u> who were related to Abraham through other means.

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
Jerusalem Riot

In his defense, Paul gives the crowd his **testimony** about Jesus.

However, what throws the crowd into a <u>frenzy</u> is when Paul says God has called him to <u>preach this new</u> faith to the **Gentiles**. (Acts 22:21)

The crowd listened to Paul until he said this. Then they raised their voices and shouted, "Rid the earth of him! He's not fit to live!" (Acts 22:22 NIV)

So why would the Jews be so upset over this?



Jerusalem Riot

When the **Apostle Paul** returns to Jerusalem along with a <u>generous offering</u> from Gentile churches, the brothers tell him that many Jews believe that he is an <u>enemy</u> of the **Jewish faith** and their traditions. [See Acts 21]

To prove his <u>innocence</u> Paul goes to the Temple and shows that he is "living in obedience to the law."

However, this <u>visit</u> causes **a riot** and Roman troops have to come and rescue Paul from the angry mob.

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Sons of Abraham

The Jews believed that what made them <u>special as children of God</u> was their **genealogical** connection to Abraham.

So when someone implied that this was <u>no longer critical</u>, it made them ${f furious}.$

And to tell you the truth, **Jesus** encountered the same problem, when he rebuked the Jews for being <u>slaves to sin</u> and that <u>their real father was the</u> devil.

They answered him, "We are **Abraham's** <u>descendants</u> and have never been slaves of anyone. <u>How can you say that we shall be set free?</u>" (John 8:33 NIV)

Jesus then responds, "I know you are **Abraham's descendants**. Yet you are ready to kill me, because you have **no room for my word**." (John 8:37 NIV)

John the Baptist

But when he saw many of the **Pharisees** and **Sadducees** coming to where he was baptizing, he said to them: "**You brood of vipers!** Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath?" (Matthew 3:7 NIV)

"Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not think you can say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham." (Matthew 3:8–9 NIV)



Romans 9

In my opinion, understanding **Romans 9** is one of the most important requirements for any serious Bible student.

For within it contains the whole reason for **Israel's failure** and a <u>clue</u> to our own **spiritual DNA** and God's purpose in election.

And why did Israel fail? According to the Apostle Paul, For not all who are <u>descended</u> from **Israel** are Israel. Nor because they are his <u>descendants</u> are they all **Abraham's children**. (Romans 9:6–7 NIV)

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Romans 9

In other words, it is not the **natural children** who are God's children, but it is the **children of the promise** who are regarded as **Abraham's offspring**. (Romans 9:8 NIV)

And who are the "children of the promise?"

They are those who are <u>born supernaturally</u> (like **Issac**) by **God's mercy** and **power**. (See Romans 9:7-8)

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Not by **their** <u>desire</u> or <u>effort</u>, but by the **will** of the **Sovereign Lord**. (See Romans 9:16)

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
Wee Little Man

In the Gospel of Luke, there is a story about a man named, **Zacchaeus**, who lived in the city

Zacchaeus, who lived in the city of Jericho.

He was <u>hated</u> by the Jews because he was a chief tax collector and was wealthy (Luke 19:2 NIV)

However, when he heard that Jesus was coming, he ran ahead and because he was short <u>climbed</u> a sycamore-fig tree.



Wee Little Man

When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down immediately. I must stay at your house today." (Luke 19:5 NIV)

All the people saw this and began to mutter, "He has gone to be the guest of a 'sinner.'" (Luke 19:7 NIV)



Wee Little Man

But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the **Lord**, "Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount." (Luke 19:8 NIV)

Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a **son of Abraham**." (Luke 19:9 NIV)



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Nathanael

Philip found **Nathanael** and told him, "We have found **the one** Moses wrote about in the Law, and about whom the prophets also wrote — **Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph.**" (John 1:44–45 NIV)

"Nazareth! Can anything good come from there?" Nathanael asked. "Come and see," said Philip. (John 1:46 NIV)



Nathanael

When Jesus saw Nathanael approaching, he said of him, "Here is a **true Israelite**, in whom there is nothing false." (John 1:47 NIV)

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"How do you know me?" Nathanael asked. Jesus answered, "**I saw you** while you were still under the fig tree before Philip called you." (John 1:48 NIV)

Then Nathanael declared, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; you are the King of Israel." (John 1:49 NIV)

Summary

God looks at the heart and He knows who has a "heart to serve" Him, even before they even come to faith.

"I am the **good shepherd**; <u>I know</u> <u>my sheep</u> and my sheep know me . . . " (John 10:14 NIV)

"I have **other sheep** that are not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also. They too will **listen** to my voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd." (John 10:16 NIV)



More Evidence

In **Corinth**, the Apostle Paul was having much success among the Jews and the Church was growing.

However, there also was **much persecution**.

In a **dream**, **Jesus** appears to Paul and <u>encourages</u> him to keep on preaching.

As he says, "For I am with you, and no one is going to attack and harm you, because I have **many people** in this city." (Acts 18:10)

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Summary

Whether we know it or not God **chose us** to be in Christ, <u>long before</u> we actually came to Christ.

For it is the Lord who is constantly at work—searching hearts and examining the minds to see who has the capacity or right spiritual DNA to serve Him.

So when He finds someone who has **"room in their heart"** for God's Word, they are <u>equipped</u> and <u>enabled</u> to **believe** the Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

As it is written in Acts, When the Gentiles heard this, they were glad and honored the word of the Lord; and all who were **appointed** for eternal life believed. (Acts 13:48 NIV)

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Sermon on the Mount

Jesus calls out to the **spiritual children of Abraham** on the **Sermon on the Mount** when he says:

"Blessed are the **poor in spirit** (they who recognize their need for redemption), for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 5:3 NIV)

"Blessed are those who **mourn** (they who grieve over their poor spiritual state), for <u>they will be comforted</u>." (Matthew 5:4 NIV, See also Romans 7:14-25)

"Blessed are the **meek** (they who are submissive, yielding, and willing), for they will inherit the earth." (Matthew 5:5 NIV)

"Blessed are those who **hunger and thirst for righteousness** (they who want to do right), for they will be filled." (Matthew 5:6 NIV)

Summary

The **point** of all of this is as follows:

Even though we were **sinners** and in need of mercy, God **chose** us to be on His team. Not because of anything we had done, but because He saw in our hearts that we had the same **spiritual DNA** as Abraham.

And to tell you the truth, there are **people** <u>all around us</u> who are spiritually related to Abraham as well.

All they need is **faith**, and *faith comes from* <u>hearing</u> the message, and the message is heard through the <u>word of Christ</u>. (Romans 10:17 NIV)

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Conclusion

We who are in **Christ** are <u>special</u> because we are related to Abraham and thus have the right to be called **"children of God,"** *children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.* (John 1:13 NIV)

So then, be **very encouraged** for you are <u>special</u> and God **chose** you because "you had room in your heart" for **God's Word**.

Therefore, let your **light shine**, because all around you are **spiritual relatives** who are <u>primed</u> and <u>ready</u> and just need **reasons** <u>in which to</u> believe.

I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest. (John 4:35 NIV)
