- **My heart** is set on keeping your decrees to the very end. (v. 112)


PSALM 119

- Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path. (v. 105)
- I have taken an oath and confirmed it, that I will follow your righteous laws. (v. 106)
- I have suffered much; **preserve my life**, O LORD, according to your word. (v. 107)
- Accept, O LORD, the willing praise of my mouth, and teach me your laws. (v. 108)
- Though I constantly take my life in my hands, I will not forget your law. (v. 109)

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INTRODUCTION

- Erik Weihenmayer is an amazing athlete and adventurer.
- He's kayaked all 277 miles of the Colorado River and through the Grand Canyon, which, according to one source, is "considered one of the most formidable whitewater venues in the world."
- He has climbed the "seven summits" of the world, that is, the highest mountain peak on all seven continents.



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INTRODUCTION

- He has climbed the face of El Capitan in Yosemite National Park.
- He has biked from Hanoi to Ho Chi Minh City.
- He has climbed Mount Everest.
- And after accomplishing this feat, he was featured on the cover of TIME magazine.
- Even more remarkable, Erik Weihenmayer is blind!



INTRODUCTION

- He's been this way since he was a kid.
- When he was only 15 months old, he was diagnosed with juvenile retinoschisis.
- Doctors said he would be **totally blind** by age 13. And he was.



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INTRODUCTION

- He tells the story of a descent off the face of El Capitan.
- He was with several other climbers.
- They had already spent one night in a sling-enhanced bivouac on the cliff, and were now trying to get off the mountain before nightfall.
- Unfortunately, They failed.



INTRODUCTION

- Night descended on them before they were able to finish their descent.
- They were all in the dark.
- So they turned to the one man who had the most experience climbing in the dark: Erik.
- He led them down and out safely.
- The **blind** leading the sighted.



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THE DARK

- Our Scripture reading tonight is a series of quotations about the overriding importance of the Word of God.
- Each verse stands alone.
- But the psalmist says in verse 110 that "the wicked have laid a snare for me, but I do not stray from your precepts."
- So, the theme of tonight's sermon is: How to walk in the dark and keep our feet from falling.

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THE DARK

- If were on a well-known path, we might not need a light at all.
- Sometimes, the **light of the moon** is sufficient to guide us on a common, if narrow, pathway.
- This text tonight suggests that the traveler of Psalm 119 is both in the dark and walking an unknown path.
- He is also surrounded by the wicked who want him to stop serving God.

THE DARK

- Often when we're in the dark, we're clueless.
- For instant, when we are in uncharted territory without lights, signal markers, hints, landmarks, white roadside stripes, a flashlight, a smartphone or infrared night-vision googles, it can be terrifying.
- And when we are terrified or afraid, we can become **immobilized** and don't know what to do.
- Life can even come to a **standstill** where we don't know whether we should turn to the left or turn to the right.

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THE DARK

- This is why the **wayfarer** is so glad to have a **lamp** or a **light**.
- It **illuminates** where his feet are stepping, and it shows the path ahead.
- Now there are three important things to also consider when walking at night or in the darkness:
 - 1. Watch your step **directly in front** of you for there might be a rock, root, or children's toy that might cause you to trip.
 - 2. Keep an eye **up ahead** because the terrain might be changing drastically, and
 - 3. Know **where** you are going.

LOW & HIGH BEAM

 When we're walking in the dark or especially driving down a dark road, we want to have some idea of what's ahead.

 In fact our automobiles are equipped for that important need.

 We have a low beam to see things right before us and a high beam to see things far off.




LOW & HIGH BEAM

 When we're driving down a familiar road and the moon is out, we don't the "high beam" on our car.

 However, when we're on unfamiliar territory and things are moving fast, we're going to need all the light we can get.

• Especially, when we are also in a **storm**.



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LOW & HIGH BEAM

- This is when the **High Beam** on our cars becomes very important.
- It **shines** a lot further down the road where we can see things rushing toward us.
- If we see **danger** before it gets to us we have time to prepare.
- If we have time to prepare, we can deal with the trouble and possibly avoid a major catastrophe.




LOW & HIGH BEAM

 Since evil lurks in the darkness, we need a lamp for our feet.

 But when evil lurks in the darkness and life is moving ever so fast, and we're also in uncharted territory, that Spiritual Lamp of ours needs to on its high beam settings.

• We get this **light** when we press in to God.

THE LIGHT OF LIFE

- When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)
- When we follow Christ and walk in his teachings, we grow in virtue and our ability to discern all things and so avoid danger on the road of life.
- If fact, through Christ, God has rescued us from the dominion of darkness (Col. 1:13), so that we can walk in his wonderful light (High Beam) (1 Peter 2:9).

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FUEL FOR THE LIGHT

- The source of every **light** requires **fuel**.
- If we don't have **fuel**, we won't have light.
- If we don't have **light**, we can't see in the darkness.
- If we can't see in the **darkness**, we can get **hurt** or **led astray** regardless of our intent.
- So then, **wisdom** teaches us to always carry fuel for the fire so that we can have **light**.
- Common sense would tell us, to do otherwise would be **foolish**.

SONS OF THE LIGHT

- This is why the Apostle Paul says what he says to the Thessalonians. He says,
 - Brothers, you are not in **darkness** . . .
 - You are all **sons** of the **light** and **sons** of **the day**.
 - We do not belong to the **night** or to the darkness. (1 Th. 5:4-5)
- Does anyone remember what the context was to the above verses?
- That **this day (day of evil)** should surprise you like a **thief**. (1 Th. 5:4)

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FOOLISH VIRGINS

- However, Jesus predicts this very thing in the Gospel of Matthew in the **Parable of the 10 Virgins**. [See Matthew 25:1-13]
- In this parable,
 - All ten virgins **fall asleep** while waiting for the bridegroom.
 - But only five have a **supply of oil** for their **lamps**.
 - When the bridegroom arrives the five without oil have nothing to light their lamps.
 - By the time they get oil, it is **too late** and the door is closed and it can't be reopened.

FOOLISH VIRGINS

- So then, what is the point of this parable?
- When the bridegroom comes it will still be **dark**.
- To see our way around and find the bridegroom we will need illumination.
- Therefore, be ready and don't forget to store up some oil.



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VIRTUE

- So then, what is **virtue**?
- It is behavior showing **high moral standards**.
- Virtue can also be described as: goodness, righteousness, morality, integrity, honesty, faithfulness and trustworthiness.
- Things that were lacking in the person of the previous parable in Matthew, called the **Parable of the Unfaithful Servant**. [See Matthew 24:13-51]
- As many of you know, it didn't end well with that individual.

WISE VIRGINS

- We know that anyone who follows Christ will have the "light of life" and the ability to discern all things.
- However, according to Peter, if we lack this one thing, we will be nearsighted and blind.
- And what is this one thing?
- It is **virtue**.



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VIRTUE

- According to the Apostle Peter, adding **virtue** to our faith does something that is very special.
- It helps us from being ineffective and unproductive in your **knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ**. (2 Pet. 1:8)
- In other words, virtue produced by faith draws us close to God where we have the "mind of Christ" and can discern all things—even the signs of the time.
- Without it, we will be tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of men in their **deceitful** scheming (Eph. 4:14)

CONCLUSION

- While it is true, "God's Word" is a lamp for our feet, walking out "God's Word" shines the high beam on our path.
- Therefore, let us be like Erik Weihenmayer, who
 was able to see even in the darkness and negotiate
 his way around every obstacle in total darkness.
- Today, we are living in dark times. Good is being called evil and evil good.
- No doubt the bridegroom is on his way and will soon **judge** the earth in righteousness.

CONCLUSION

- So in the mean time let the **light of Jesus** grow in our hearts and add to **our faith** all goodness, faithfulness, and trustworthiness.
- Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. (Rom. 12:21)
- If we do, we will **never fall** and receive a **rich welcome** into the **eternal kingdom** of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. [See 2 Peter 1:10-11]
- **Look**, he is coming with the clouds, and every eye will see him, even those who **pierced him**; and all the peoples of the earth will **mourn** because of him. So shall it be! Amen. (Rev. 1:7 NIV)
