

Scripture

Jeremiah 17:5-6

- This is what the LORD says: "Cursed is the one who trusts in man,
 - who depends on flesh for his strength and
- whose **heart** turns away from the LORD.
- He will be like a **bush** in the wastelands;
- he will <u>not</u> see **prosperity** when it comes.
- He will **dwell** in the <u>parched places</u> of the **desert**,
- in a salt land where no one lives.



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Scripture

Jeremiah 17:7-8

- But blessed is the man who <u>trusts</u> in the LORD, whose <u>confidence</u> is in him.
- He will be like a **tree** <u>planted by the water</u> that sends out its roots by the stream.
- It does not **fear** when heat comes;
 - its leaves are always green.
- It has **no worries** in a year of drought and
 - never fails to bear fruit.



Scripture

Jeremiah 17:9-10

- [Nevertheless]
- The **heart** is <u>deceitful above all things</u> and <u>beyond cure</u>.
- Who can <u>understand</u> it?
- "I the LORD search the heart and examine the mind,
- to **reward** a man according to his conduct,
- according to what his deeds deserve."



Introduction

- He was only 29 when he died.
- The cause was heart failure brought on by <u>alcohol</u> and <u>drug</u> abuse.
- In his short life and <u>career as a musician</u>, he managed to score 11, # 1 hits on the Billboard charts, and another 24 that made the top 10.
- He managed this remarkable feat without ever learning how to read music.
- When Nashville's Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum was established in 1961, he was one of the first two inductees.



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Introduction

- Despite his success, he was in many ways a broken man.
- Nevertheless, America's country music fans didn't seem to care so much.
- There was **earthy truth** in the <u>simple</u>, <u>gritty</u> songs of **Hank Williams Sr.**
- Somehow it made up for all his rough edges.



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Introduction

- Among Williams' <u>best-known hits</u> is a little cry-into-yourbeer ditty.
- The first two stanzas go like this:
 - Your **cheatin' heart**Will make you weep.
 You'll cry and cry
 And try to sleep.
 - But sleep won't come The whole night through. Your **cheatin' heart** Will tell on you.
- The cheatin' heart in question, of course, belongs to a woman who has done her fella wrong.



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Deceitful Heart

- But that's not the only sort of cheatin' heart there is.
- Just ask the prophet, **Jeremiah**.
- He thinks everyone has a cheatin' heart.
- As he says in Jeremiah 17:9,
- The **heart** is deceitful <u>above</u> **all things** and <u>beyond</u> **cure**.
- Who can understand it?



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Original Sin

- The Scottish reformer **John Knox** agreed.
- When he and a small committee of fellow pastors penned a confession of faith for the newly formed Church of Scotland, he made sure to say referring to original sin (Scots Confession 3.03): —
 - * "The image of God was utterly defaced in man, and he and his children became by nature
 - hostile to God,
 - slaves to Satan and
 - servants to sin."



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The Human Heart

- Lots of people today think old John Knox <u>lays it on a little</u> thick.
- If you pressed them, they'd probably say much the same thing about Jeremiah — even though his words come straight from the Bible.
- Devious <u>above all else?</u> Perverse? You'll never see such sentiments printed in the middle of a lacy heart on Valentine's Day.
- We don't like to think about the **human heart** in such terms.
- Calling the human heart devious and perverse <u>runs</u> <u>counter</u> to the spirit of our age.



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Devious & Perverse

- "I like to think that, deep down, people are basically good."
- That line is an article of faith for a great many of our neighbors and friends — and maybe, if we're honest, for a lot of us as well.
- Such cheery optimism about the human condition happens to contradict the church's historic creeds, as they stress the human race's need for a redeemer.
- So, what do we make of Jeremiah's lament about the cheatin' heart?
- Must we write him off as a hater? Or, is he onto something?



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Hard Times

- **Jeremiah** is also known as a <u>prophet of hard times</u>.
- All **hell** is fixing to break loose around him.
- After a brief and encouraging reform by the good king, Josiah, the people of Judah are <u>backsliding</u> under their present king, Jehoiakim.
- They were worshiping foreign gods and
- falling into all manner of immorality.
- A Babylonian invasion is looming on the horizon while Judah's corrupt monarch does nothing but enjoy the <u>hedonistic pleasures</u> of his palace.



Faithful Few

- By contrast, a **few** remain faithful.
- In a couple of verses <u>reminiscent</u> of **Psalm 1** where this **faithful remnant** is "like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream" (v. 8).
- Jeremiah draws a <u>sharp distinction</u> between those who trust in "mere mortals" (v. 5) and those who trust in the Lord (v. 7).
- The **first group** is like a <u>transient desert plant</u> that <u>wilts</u> and <u>dies</u> under the blazing sun.
- The second has its <u>spiritual roots</u> sunk deep in <u>well-</u> watered soil, and it flourishes.



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Self-Deception

- When Jeremiah blasts the human heart as devious and perverse, he's got <u>ample evidence</u> from his own experience.
- In Hebrew thought, the human heart is the seat of reason, not emotion.
- <u>Emotion</u> is thought to reside in the abdomen: the source of what we in our culture call, "gut feelings."
- The <u>cheating</u> or <u>deceitful</u> heart of verse 9, therefore, is actually a <u>corrupted mind</u>.
- Jeremiah displays here a deep psychological understanding, and awareness of the endless capacity of the human mind to deceive itself.



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The Deceitfulness of Sin

- While, it may seem, at first, that **Jeremiah's prophecy** has <u>little to say</u> to people today.
- Our <u>optimistic</u>, <u>can-do</u>, <u>achievement-oriented</u> <u>culture</u> is less inclined to regard <u>sin</u> as a severe condition than generations past.
- Nevertheless, bad behavior is out there for all to see, screaming from News Headlines, movies, Cable TV, and social media.
- Interestingly, most people are inclined to think
 - others commit more sins than they do and
 - should be **punished** for it.

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Self-Deception

- According to the **Bible**, we live in a world <u>full of lies</u>, and <u>deceit comes</u> from many sources.
 - There are **lying spirits** who lead astray (1 Timothy 4:1);
 - there are **"evildoers and impostors"** looking for people who are easily <u>tricked</u> and <u>fooled</u> (2 Timothy 3:13); and,
 - perhaps most **insidious**, we have ourselves to deal with.
- In fact, Self-deception is probably the most common form of deception in our fallen world.

Self-Deception

- Our own hearts are deceitful—so much so that we easily fool ourselves (Jeremiah 17:9).
- Isaiah 44:20 speaks of an idolater who is misled by his own "deluded heart."
- The prophet Obadiah identifies arrogance as one of the roots of self-deception: "The pride of your heart has deceived you" (Obadiah 1:3).
- **Human pride** always <u>blinds us</u> to the truth.
- It promises honor, but it delivers disgrace: As the Bible says, "Pride goes before destruction, a haughty spirit before a fall." (Proverbs 16:18).

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Self-Deception

 Self-deception is also <u>very common</u> among religious people and people dedicated to learning Scripture.

- But Scripture was not given merely to produce theologians; it was given "so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work." (2 Timothy 3:17).
- Holding the truth in **one's mind** is <u>not</u> necessarily a **character-changing** experience.
- James 1:23–24 clearly illustrates that merely looking at oneself in a mirror is not necessarily an appearance-changing experience.
- The mirror can tell us our <u>hair is messy</u>, but the tangles will remain unless we get out the **brush** and address the problem.

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Self-Deception

- James goes on to contrast <u>self-deceived</u>, "worthless" religion with "pure and faultless" religion, giving a practical example of each.
- One type of **self-deception** is to believe that <u>our words do not matter</u>:
 - "Those who consider themselves religious and yet do not keep a <u>tight rein on</u> their tongues deceive themselves, and their religion is worthless" (James 1:26).
- Another form of deception is to replace function and purpose with a form, ritual, or ceremonial righteousness:
 - "Religion that God our Father accepts as <u>pure</u> and <u>faultless</u> is this: to look after <u>orphans</u> and <u>widows</u> in their distress and to keep oneself <u>from being</u> polluted by the world" (verse 27).

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Self-Deception

- Samson, as strong as he was, fell through self-deception . . .
 - He trusted the <u>love</u> of **Gentile women**, then <u>tragically disclosed</u> the **secret** of his strength to **Delilah**, who betrayed him to his enemies.
- The giant Goliath is another example of self-deception . . .
 - He <u>strutted</u> and <u>boasted</u> and flung insults at Israel, yet his <u>great size</u> and <u>physical</u> <u>strength</u> was <u>no match for a man after God's own heart</u>.
- Self-deception allowed the man in Jesus' parable of the "Rich Fool," . . .
 - To believe his great wealth was sufficient enough where he could take life easy, eat, drink and be merry.
 - But this was wishful thinking, for he would die that very night.

Church-Deception

Revelation 3:1-3

- To the Church of Sardis, Jesus said,
 - I know your **deeds**; you have a reputation of being alive, but you are dead.
 - Wake up!
 - Strengthen what remains and is about to die, for I have not found your deeds complete in the sight of my God.
 - Remember, therefore, what you have received and heard;
 - obey it, and repent.
 - But if you do not wake up, I will come like a thief, and you will not know at what time I will come to you.

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Church-Deception

Revelation 3:14-22

- The Church of Laodicea also was the <u>victim</u> of self-deception concerning their spiritual condition.
 - They **assumed** they were an influential church since they were materially rich.
 - However, they were wretched, pitiful, poor, blind, and naked.
 - Why? Because the ministry they offered was neither hot (therapeutic) nor cold (refreshing). Instead, it was lukewarm.
- Nevertheless, according to church history, Laodicea must have <u>harkened to the</u> words of <u>Jesus</u> as they, for several centuries, were one of the most vital churches in Asia.
- In other words, they were **overcomers**.

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How to Avoid Self-Deception?

- According to "Got Questions Ministries,"
 - We must be like the one who <u>looks intently</u> in the perfect law that gives freedom, [and]
 - continues in it
 - not forgetting what they have heard
 - but doing it.
 - For if they do, **they** will be <u>blessed</u> in what they do. (James 1:25)

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How to Avoid Self-Deception?

- Remembering the Word, doing the Word, continuing in the Word—this is what changes character and counters self-delusion because as we abide in the Truth, we develop by the Spirit—the mind of Christ.
- In other words, when we imitate Christ—offering our bodies as living sacrifices, it transforms our thinking and our ability to know and understand the truth and enables us to keep our relationship with the Lord where it should be.
- While it is true that people who lack spiritual discernment are sitting ducks for false apostles, prophets, and teachers, they are more susceptible to fall to the deceitfulness of their own unspiritual thoughts.

Balm in Gilead

- So, Jeremiah regards the corruption of his people their hopelessness, their lack of a future — and he cries out:
- Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there? Why then is there no healing for the wound of my people? (Jeremiah 8:22 NIV)
- While there is no medicine to cure a cheating heart, we can nevertheless put ourselves in a position to be transformed by grace.
- However, it is not through <u>mysticism</u>; it is not by following <u>rabbinical</u> <u>Judaism</u>; it is by <u>imitating Jesus</u>, which produces in us the <u>mind of</u> <u>Christ</u> so that <u>grace <u>may abound</u></u>.

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In Summary

- The **biggest enemy** we will ever face is <u>ourselves</u>—especially if we are walking in the ways of the world.
- To combat this problem is to develop the "mind of Christ."
- We gain this when we follow the "royal law" of Christ and be imitators of God—offering our bodies as "living sacrifices." [See Romans 12:1-2]
- Then our **minds** <u>will be transformed</u>, and we "spiritually speaking" will come to know Gods' <u>good</u>, <u>pleasing</u>, and <u>perfect will</u>. [See Romans 12:1-2]
- Then we will <u>no longer</u> be **infants**, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of **men** (including ourselves) in their **deceitful scheming**. (Ephesians 4:14 NIV)

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Spiritual Balm in Gilead

- For the **grace of God** that <u>brings salvation</u> has appeared to all men. It <u>teaches</u> us to say "No" to <u>ungodliness</u> and <u>worldly passions</u>, and to **live** <u>self-controlled</u>, <u>upright</u>, and <u>godly lives</u> in this present age, . . . (Titus 2:11–12)
- God's grace teaches us how to live out the truth so that our lies will no longer deceive us.
- Do not <u>merely listen</u> to the **word**, and so deceive yourselves. <u>Do what it says</u>. (James 1:22)
- And as we do, the **spiritual balm of Gilead** will heal our **cheating hearts**.
- Spiritual enlightenment and the knowledge of God come from imitating Christ
 and following His word. It will keep us safe from all self-deception and a whole lot
 more
