

Scripture

Jeremiah 2:5-6

- This is what the **LORD** says:
 - "What fault did your **fathers** find in me that they strayed so far from me?
 - They <u>followed</u> worthless idols and <u>became</u> worthless themselves.
 - ■They did not ask, 'Where is the LORD,
 - who brought us up out of Egypt and
 - <u>led us through</u> the **barren wilderness**, through a **land of deserts** and **rifts**, a **land** <u>of drought</u> and <u>darkness</u>,
 - a land where no one travels, and no one lives?'

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Scripture

Jeremiah 2:7-8

- I brought you into a **fertile land** to eat its <u>fruit</u> and <u>rich produce</u>.
- But **you** came and **defiled** <u>my land</u> and made my **inheritance** detestable.
- ■The priests did not ask, 'Where is the LORD?'
- Those who deal with the law did not know me;
- the **leaders** rebelled against me.
- The **prophets** prophesied by Baal following worthless idols.

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Scripture

Jeremiah 2:9-11

- "Therefore I bring **charges** <u>against you again</u>," declares the **LORD**.
- "And I will bring **charges** against your children's children.
- Cross over to the coasts of **Kittim** and <u>look</u>, send to **Kedar** and <u>observe closely</u>; see if there has ever been anything like this:
 - Has a nation ever changed its gods?
- But my people have <u>exchanged</u> their **Glory** <u>for worthless idols</u>.

Scripture

Jeremiah 2:12-13

- Be appalled at this, O heavens, and shudder with great horror," declares the LORD.
- "My people have committed two sins:
- They have <u>forsaken me</u>, the **spring** <u>of</u> <u>living water</u>, and
- have dug their own cisterns,
- broken cisterns that cannot hold water.



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Introduction

- In December 2021, a jury in Chicago found actor Jussie Smollett, a one-time star in the TV hiphop drama Empire, guilty of five of six felony disorderly conduct charges in connection with an incident the previous year.
- Smollett claimed at the time that two masked men wearing MAGA hats...
 - assaulted him,
 - put a **noose** around his neck, and
 - doused him with chemicals.



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Introduction

- After <u>investigating</u> his claim, however,
 police concluded that <u>Smollett paid</u>
 two men \$3,500 to carry out the
 scheme, which the actor characterized as a <u>hate crime</u> against himself.
- Prosecutors said that the 39-year-old actor orchestrated the attack as a hoax to raise his show-business profile.



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Introduction

- Smollett was sentenced on March 10, 2022, to 150 days in county jail.
- The revelation that the incident was a setup of his own doing dealt a severe and possibly fatal blow to Smollett's career just the opposite of what he apparently was hoping to achieve by the faked attack.
- After he was arrested, Smollett <u>lost his role as a</u> singer-songwriter in the final season of Empire.
- And during the trial, he admitted in court: "I've lost my livelihood."



Introduction

- On March 16, 2022, Smollett was released pending the outcome of an appeal.
- Howard Breuer, CEO of Newsroom PR, put it bluntly when he said.
 - "Smollett now joins Bill Cosby, Matt Lauer, and Kevin Spacey
 - on the **Mount Rushmore** of the forever canceled."



The Unprofitable Exchange

Jeremiah 2:12-13

- I've mentioned **Smollett's story** not to add to his critics but as a modern-day example of something God says in our Jeremiah passage about the **people of Judah**:
 - "... my people have changed their glory for something that does not profit" (v. 11).
- And in even **sharper detail**, **God** said,
- → "my people ... have forsaken me, the fountain of living water, and dug out cisterns for themselves, cracked cisterns that can hold no water" (v. 13).

The Unprofitable Exchange

Jeremiah 2:12-13

- The **theme** of these verses is how some **abandon** the Lord for something
 - far less and
 - fail to recognize
- that God is the source of life and well-being.
- Smollett, by his hoax, did something similar and exchanged his rising-star career for exile from the work he professed to love.

The Unprofitable Exchange

- Both Smollett's folly and Judah's failure to keep faith with God were forms of self-sabotage.
- In fact, **self-sabotage** is <u>more common</u> in the **human condition** than we might expect and is symptomatic of mental, emotional, and/or spiritual problems.
- According to psychologists, **Self-Sabotage** is the act of destroying or damaging, either consciously or unconsciously, what is really in our **best interest**.
- In other words, **Self-Sabotage** is the foolish practice of self-hate often done as a result of low self-esteem or guilt.



The Unprofitable Exchange

Consider this list of some **behaviors** that could be described as <u>self-defeating</u> or <u>self-sabotage</u>:

- Avoid people or situations that might cause fear, hurt, or pain. (The idea is that if one avoids risk — if you don't commit to a job, person, direction, or goal — you can't fail.)
- Not standing up for oneself or being unable to ask for what one needs.
- 3. Constantly seeking attention or approval from others.
- Aggression, <u>bullying</u>, and <u>verbal</u>, <u>emotional</u>, or <u>physical</u>
 abuse (Often, abuse **hides** <u>one's own feelings</u> of <u>insecurity</u>, <u>unworthiness</u>, and <u>poor self-image</u>.)



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The Unprofitable Exchange

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- Substance abuse or other addictive behavior (overeating, gambling, overspending, risky sexual patterns, workaholic syndrome, etc.).
- 7. Procrastination.
- 8. Patterns of lack of punctuality.
- Picking fights with <u>friends</u> or <u>partners</u> over inconsequential matters.
- 10. Refusing to accept responsibility for one's own mistakes.
- 11. Blaming others for difficulties in one's life.
- 12. Inability to receive constructive criticism.



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Failure to Learn from Experience

- Now Experience, some say, is the best teacher,
 - but acts of **self-sabotage** suggest that we <u>frequently</u> do not learn from our losses and
 - instead, go on repeating self-defeating actions in our lives.
- The person ...
 - who always comes to work late and
 - those who complicate their lives by <u>postponing</u> <u>important obligations</u>
- are effectively shooting themselves in the foot, again and again, and eventually, they have no foot left.



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Failure to Learn from Experience

- The young essayist **Kris Kidd** may be a case in point.
- He has a gift for putting into words the depression and self-destruction that has marked his experience in life thus far.
- One reviewer of his work Office Magazine — says that Kidd gives readers "a monstrous glimpse into his inner world."



Failure to Learn from Experience

- Here's something Kidd wrote about his self-inflicted wounds:
 - **Sadness** is a way of <u>escaping</u> the abstraction of happiness.
 - **Rock bottom** is a surprisingly comfortable place to lay one's head. <u>No responsibilities</u>.
 - Falling feels awful; <u>I'd rather stay at</u> the bottom.



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A Question of Growth

- **Kidd** is in his late 20s, but in truth, even some of us who are more **mature** and **healthy** sometimes do things we know will <u>handicap our future</u> and <u>hurt others as well</u>.
- We may puzzle over our **motives**, <u>but we do these things</u> <u>nonetheless</u>.
- One way of moving **forward** is to ask ourselves
 - what we are getting out of unprofitable behavior
- that <u>exchanges</u> the **water of life** <u>for dry and cracked</u> cisterns.

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A Question of Growth

- Psychologist and former priest EugeneC. Kennedy says that
 - <u>asking ourselves</u> what we are getting out of our <u>self-destructive behavior</u>
 - "helps us achieve the selfknowledge ... which is
 - indispensable for <u>further steps</u> toward maturity."



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A Question of Growth

- **Kennedy** goes on to say that
- if we want to see ourselves whole,
- to see our actions in a way that can lead to a new <u>understanding of</u> ourselves,
- we can begin. . . by asking
- What am I getting out of this anyway?



Woman at the Well

- Sensing that his popularity was growing too strong, Jesus leaves Judea and heads for Galilee.
- His journey takes him through Samaria, and at a town called Sychar, he and his disciples stop to rest.
- While his disciples go into town to purchase provisions, Jesus asks a woman for a drink of water from the well.
- However, since she isn't a Jew, she asks Jesus, "How can you ask me for a drink?"



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Woman at the Well

- Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." (John 4:10)
- Finally, realizing that Jesus wasn't talking about physical water but spiritual water, the woman asks for the water Jesus is offering—water that satisfies the soul and gives eternal life.
- But before she could come to the place where she could receive this gift, she had to <u>come clean</u> with her <u>destructive</u> <u>behaviors</u> and <u>attitudes</u>.



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Woman at the Well

- While she wasn't necessarily lying about her marital status, she was deeply involved in sin and several self-defeating relationships with men.
- Nevertheless, her desire for "living water" was greater than her desire for emptiness and shame.
- Jesus declared, "Believe me, woman, a time is coming and has now come when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks. (John 4:21a, 23)



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The Road to Living Waters

- This Monday, September 12th, I will be 68 years old.
- Forty years ago, when I was 28 years old, I became a Christian.
- I did so because I wanted living water and was tired of being miserable, unhappy, and depressed.
- For too long, I followed the **ways of this world**, and what **faith** <u>I did have</u> was <u>corrupted</u> by **self-destructive** <u>attitudes</u> and <u>actions</u>.
- Although I thought of myself as a Christian, I was not worshipping the Lord as a "true worshipper."
- I never went to church, prayed, or studied the Bible.
- Instead, I ignored God and paid the price, and the pleasures of this world didn't satisfy me. I was very thirsty for the Holy Spirit and rivers of "Living Water."

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The Road to Living Waters

- Finally, coming to the **conclusion** that I wasn't heading down the road, I asked **God** for his forgiveness and **stopped** ignoring him.
- The more I <u>poured</u> my life into becoming a "true worshipper," the more I was <u>filled</u> with <u>joy</u> and <u>satisfaction</u> and no longer had any desire for those <u>self-sabotaging</u> <u>attitudes</u> or <u>actions</u>.
- In fact, as some of you know, I would wake up in the morning with a **song in my heart** and a whole **new** <u>attitude</u> and <u>disposition</u>.
- So I say to everyone, reject the empty cisterns of this world and instead dig deep for the "Living waters" from God's Spirit, and you will have peace and grace.

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Conclusion

- For if we become "true worshippers" of God through the words of Christ, we will always be spiritually satisfied, which will protect us from unhealthy or destructive attitudes that lead to destructive actions and behaviors.
- So then.
 - Do to others what you would want them to do to you.
 - Show **sacrificial love** to everyone—even your enemies.
 - Be a witness of what God can do through those who believe.
 - Become **imitators** of a **Holy God** and remember the weak.
- If so, your **cisterns** won't leak, and you will keep yourself filled with "living water."
