- <u>Hate</u> what is **evil**; <u>cling</u> to what is **good**.
- Be <u>devoted</u> to **one another** in **brotherly love**.
- Honor one another above yourselves.
- Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord.
- Be joyful in hope, patient in **affliction**, and faithful in **prayer**.

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# **Scripture**

Romans 12:13-16

- Share with God's people who are in need.
- <u>Practice</u> hospitality.
- <u>Bless</u> those who persecute you; <u>bless</u> and <u>do not curse</u>.
- Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn.
- <u>Live in harmony</u> with **one another**.
- Do not be proud, but be willing to associate with people of low position.
- Do <u>not</u> be **conceited**.

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# **Scripture**

Romans 12:17-19

- Do <u>not</u> repay **anyone** <u>evil for evil</u>.
- Be <u>careful</u> to do what is right in the eyes of **everybody**.
- If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone.
- Do <u>not</u> take **revenge**, my friends, but <u>leave room</u> for **God's wrath**, for it is written:
- "It is **mine** to avenge;
- I will repay," says the Lord.

**Scripture** 


Romans 12:20-21

- On the contrary:
  - "If your **enemy** is <u>hungry</u>,
  - feed him;
  - if he is thirsty,
  - give him something to drink.
- In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head."
- Do <u>not</u> be **overcome** by evil, but **overcome** evil with good.

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#### Introduction

- Some of you might be familiar with a TV program called "Antiques Roadshow" if you've spent time watching public television.
- It started in **England**, and many shows are still filmed there.
- But they also have an American version.



#### Introduction

- The premise of "Antiques Roadshow" is simple: a team of antique experts sets up shop in a convention center.
- They invite people to <u>search</u> their
- attics, safe-deposit boxes, and basement corners for ...
- their most treasured family heirloom,
- then bring it in to be appraised.



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#### Introduction

- The program is composed of brief, one- and two-minute segments.
- Where an **expert** looks over a person's treasure, searching for a maker's mark or telltale design feature that identifies it as genuine.
- Then, we get to watch the expression on the person's face as the **expert** declares ...
  - the item's <u>value</u> or
  - if it's just a worthless fake.



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#### Introduction

- Many of these items have sentimental value, which means their owners would treasure and keep them regardless of their financial value.
- But it's still a **special joy** for the owner to learn that greatgrandpa's battered old dresser is a genuine Chippendale.
- Worth \$4,000.00.



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#### Introduction

- "Let love be genuine," says the apostle Paul.
- As good as it feels to learn that your childhood electrictrain **locomotive** is a classic.
- It's far more gratifying ...
- to know that the person you **love** ...
- sincerely loves you back.



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#### Introduction

- But how can you tell for certain?
- How do you go about appraising the quality of love at the heart of ...
  - a marriage,
  - a friendship, or
  - the bond between parent and
- This brief passage from Romans reveals what to look for:
- the maker's mark,
- by which we know that we have the real thing.



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### Love is Ethical

- Again, "Let love be genuine," Paul says (Romans 12:9).
- But then he says, "Hate what is evil; hold fast to what is good."
- The <u>assumption</u> is that **true love** is <u>ethical</u> to its very core.
- It seeks out and holds up all that is **good**.
- It singles out and spurns all that is evil, selfish, and self-centered.



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#### Love is Ethical

- You may never have thought of your love relationships as a greenhouse in which ethical behavior is nurtured, but that's exactly how the Bible sees them.
- When a bride walks down the church aisle to meet her <u>beloved</u>, not many people think of the two of them <u>establishing a basic unit of</u> Christian mission.
- But that's <u>exactly</u> what's happening (or what's meant to).



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### Love is Ethical

- When a **family** gathers around a dinner table
  - to talk with each other and
  - share news of the day,
  - few will identify that gathering as a school of virtue.
- But, again, that's how God views it.
- Those love relationships in which we find ourselves all have a higher purpose in the Christian understanding.



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### Love is Ethical

- The Greek word Paul uses here for "hate" is a very strong one.
- It means something like "utterly despise and shun."
- In a similar way, the word for "holding fast" to the good comes from a root that means "to glue together."
- God has given us <u>marriages</u>, <u>families</u>, <u>friendships</u>, and the <u>larger fellowship of Christians</u> for a **purpose**: that, collectively,
  - we may send evil packing out the back door, even as ...
  - we greet good coming in the front.




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#### Mission Statement?

- Stephen Covey, the management expert who wrote the best-selling <u>The 7</u> <u>Habits of Highly Effective</u> <u>People</u>, had a radical idea.
- He believed every community of people not just <u>businesses</u> and <u>institutions</u>, but even <u>marriages</u> and <u>families</u> ought to have a <u>mission</u> statement.





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#### Mission Statement?

- Whether or not the statement is ever written down on a piece of paper, he advised that it should be ...
  - the important thing is that every group member knows why they're together, and
  - what they've been collectively placed on this Earth to do.



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## Mission & Purpose

- Your marriage, family, and significant relationship are not incidental to God.
- They have been <u>created</u> for a **purpose**.
- So then, what is that larger purpose?
  - And in him, you, too, are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit. (Ephesians 2:22)
- For where **two or three** come together in my name, there **am I** with them. (Matthew 18:20)
- Be <u>very careful</u>, then, how you <u>live</u> not as <u>unwise</u> but as <u>wise</u>, making the most of every opportunity because the <u>days</u> are evil. (Ephesians 5:15-16)



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# Mission & Purpose

- This is why the Apostle Paul says, "Be <u>devoted</u> to **one another** in **brotherly love**" (12:10).
- You've probably heard that the Greek language has three principal words for "love."
- Agape is the highest form of love.
- It's the utterly self-giving, sacrificial,
- altruistic (concern for the well-being of others) sort of love,
- such as Christ showed on the cross.

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# Mission & Purpose

- There's also *eros*,
  - the <u>magnetic attraction</u> of **one person** to another of the <u>opposite</u> sex,
- which accounts for things like a **romantic crush**.
- Then there's *phileo*, the <u>love of brother or sister</u> for **each other**.
- The word here in verse 10 is the Greek word phila (love)-delphia (brother).
- So then what the Apostle Paul says, "Be devoted to one another in brotherly love or brotherly kindness" (12:10)
- He means we should be very <u>loving</u> and <u>loyal</u> to **each other**.

### Mission & Purpose

- Paul's advice about love to the Christian community at large is just as true within that special community of two.
  - "Love one another with brotherly and sisterly affection." or
  - Be as bonded to **one another** as a brother or sister.
- NOTE:
- We may <u>choose</u> a husband or wife, but we <u>don't</u> choose brothers or sisters.
- A marriage may end in divorce, but it's impossible to divorce siblings — though some of us may wish at times we could!

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## Mission & Purpose

- We're bound to certain other **people** throughout our lives.
  - our blood brothers or sisters,
  - adoptive siblings, or in-laws,
  - stepbrothers or stepsisters,
  - all individual Christians, whom he considers <u>brothers</u> and <u>sisters</u> in Christ, and
  - whenever the <u>church gathers</u>, it's like a huge **family dinner** table — the <u>circle</u> <u>of brotherly and sisterly love</u> drawn ever wider.

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## Marriages in Trouble

- A Christian's spouse is Included in that collection of people as well.
- That insight has <u>powerful</u> implications for <u>divorce</u> in <u>our culture</u>, which — we'll surely all agree — <u>happens far more often</u> in <u>American society</u> than it needs to.
- Even **secular psychological** research bears this out.
  - Around 55-60% of divorces, according to Penn State sociologist Paul Amato, are what he calls "low-conflict divorces."
  - These take place when one partner in a marriage simply wakes up one day and realizes they want out.

Marriages in Trouble

 There's no abuse or infidelity worth mentioning, no glaring personal betrayal — just a soul-chilling weariness with day-today cares and conflicts, coupled with a lack of desire to do anything about it.

- In other words, the marriage has become bogged down in the sheer dailyness of life.
- As an Irish \* proverb puts it:
- "Marriages are all happy.
- It's having breakfast together that causes all the trouble."

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# Marriages in Trouble

- Many of these distressed marriages, an increasing number of psychologists say, can be <u>saved</u> if only the partners will
  - agree to work together in therapy,
  - learning ...
  - practical skills for communication and
  - emotional support.
- Yes, marital therapy is a hard road and may lead to <u>conflict</u> at times, but that should <u>come as no surprise</u> to anyone.

# Marriages in Trouble

- The <u>prime indicator</u> of <u>divorce</u>, experts have been telling us for some time, is
- not conflict,
- but habitual avoidance of conflict,
- which leads to <u>overwhelming</u> despair and apathy
- that <u>slowly saps</u> the **will** <u>to do the</u> essential work of being married.



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### Love in Practice

- Practicing "<u>brotherly</u> or <u>sisterly</u> <u>love</u> toward one another with mutual affection" is
  - a decision,
  - not an emotional state.
- The simple, seemingly paradoxical truth is that the way to find the love we want in a committed relationship is to begin by practicing loving behaviors.
- We may <u>not</u> choose our **feelings**, but we <u>do</u> <u>choose</u> our **behaviors**.



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### Love not in Practice

- Marriage trouble comes when one or both partners feel the quality of their relationship starting to slide and begin practicing destructive behaviors.
- They <u>withhold</u> affection.
- They <u>yell</u> and <u>intimidate</u>.
- They pout.
- They leave the house.
- They play the "blame game."



# **Loving Behaviors**

- If even one partner is able, intentionally, to put such frustrations aside for a time and demonstrate loving behaviors, the relationship can be transformed.
  - Instead of criticizing, <u>listen</u>.
  - Instead of pouting, share your feelings.
  - Instead of blaming, accept responsibility.
  - Instead of taking your spouse for granted, practice gratitude.
- There's no guarantee, but it does happen more often than not: if you practice love, you will find it.



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#### The Whole Point

- Here in lies the whole point, we reap what we sow!
- If we <u>sow</u> to the <u>Spirit</u>, we will <u>reap</u> from the <u>Spirit</u> the <u>fruits</u> of the <u>Spirit</u>.
- In other words, when we <u>sow self-giving, sacrificial, altruistic</u> love in our marriages and family, and <u>brotherly kindness</u> in our other relationships—even our <u>enemies</u>,
- God does a work of grace in them, and also,
- especially in **us** (30, 60, or 100-fold).
- This is why the Scripture says, "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." (Luke 6:38)



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### The Whole Point

- I have discovered that if I have the fruits of God's Spirit in my life, such as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, and goodness (Galatians 5:22), I'm much less likely to get ...
  - involved in road rage or participating in riots,
  - medicate myself with <u>drugs</u>, <u>alcohol</u>, or other things,
  - create drama on an airliner or at an airport,
  - beat my wife or kick my dog,
  - or say or do something I wished I hadn't.



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#### Conclusion

- Since God is love.
  - Let us <u>live</u> a **life of love** so that by <u>imitating</u> the **virtues** of the godhead,
  - we may be transformed by the Spirit ...
- so that we can <u>run with</u> perseverance.
- the race marked out for us.
- <u>Life is hard</u>, so let us not make it <u>harder</u> on ourselves by <u>hardening</u> our <u>hearts</u> against <u>God's Holy Spirit</u>.



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# Conclusion

 Sow good seed, and you will reap good fruit in your marriages, in all your relationships, and even in dealing with your enemies.

- Just as Christ died to fulfill the will of the Father and later was resurrected by God's power,
  - so shall we if we experience resurrection power that transforms us,
  - when we <u>honor</u> the teachings of God's Son and remain loyal to Him.
- As the Apostle Paul tells Timothy, The goal of this command is love, which comes from a <u>pure heart</u>, a <u>good conscience</u>, and a sincere (genuine) faith. (1 Timothy 1:5)
- You may be surprised, Sincere faith is worth a lot! More than anyone knows! Ask God (the appraiser), and He will tell you.
