NIGHT VISION

SCRIPTURE

- Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy hill.
- Let all who live in the land <u>tremble</u>, for the day of the LORD is coming.
- It is close at hand (Joel 2:1)— a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and blackness. (Joel 2:2a)
- Like dawn spreading across the mountains, a large and mighty army comes, such as never was of old nor ever will be in ages to come. (Joel 2:2b)

SCRIPTURE

- Before them, fire devours; behind them, a flame blazes. (Joel 2:3a)
- Before them, the land is like the garden of Eden; behind them, a desert waste — nothing escapes them. (Joel 2:3b)
- They have the appearance of **horses**; they gallop along like cavalry. (Joel 2:4)
- With a noise like that of chariots, they <u>leap over</u> the mountaintops, like a crackling fire consuming stubble, like a mighty army drawn up for battle. (Joel 2:5)

SCRIPTURE

- At the sight of them, **nations** are in anguish; every face turns **pale**. (Joel 2:6)
- They charge like warriors; they scale walls like soldiers. They all march in line, <u>not</u> swerving from their course. (Joel 2:7)
- They do not jostle each other; each marches straight ahead. They plunge through defenses without breaking ranks. (Joel 2:8)
- They rush upon the city; they run along the wall. They climb into the houses; like thieves, they enter through the windows. (Joel 2:9)

SCRIPTURE

- Before them, the earth shakes, the sky trembles, the sun and moon are <u>darkened</u>, and the stars <u>no longer shine</u>. (Joel 2:10)
- The LORD thunders at the head of his army; his forces are beyond number, and mighty are those who obey his command. (Joel 2:11a)
- * The day of the LORD is great; it is dreadful. (Joel 2:11b)
- Who can endure it? (Joel 2:11c)

INTRODUCTION

- It's not uncommon for those north of their 60s to confess an aversion to driving at night.
- The usual complaint is that the glare of oncoming headlights makes it difficult to see the road (or runway), especially if it is raining.
- This phenomenon is a sure sign of cataracts, which is an easily treatable yet expensive condition.



INTRODUCTION

- Even after cataract surgery, however, many of the elderly dislike nighttime driving.
- This is why they might be interested in so-called night driving glasses.
- These spectacles are usually non-prescription glasses with yellow-tinted lenses.
- * They often include some **anti-reflective** coating.
- This helps prevent reflections from streetlights and oncoming headlights that cause eyeglass glare.



INTRODUCTION

- But there's a catch: They don't work very well.
- According to a **study** published by the Journal of the American Medical Association, the data suggests ...
- "that wearing yellow-lens glasses when driving at night does not improve performance.
- Particularly in the most critical task: detection of pedestrians."



INTRODUCTION

- Those affected might try another option: night vision goggles.
- But these, too, have their drawbacks. Night vision goggles are <u>expensive</u>.
- The Banshee Dual Tube Articulating Night Vision Goggle will set you back \$5,895.
- For better quality, try a pair of the L3Harris Ground Panoramic Night Vision Goggles, which can be yours for the low price of \$43,000.



INTRODUCTION

- * Night vision goggles are also impractical.
- Some must be handheld, which is difficult for an elderly person driving 55 mph at night thus making it quite dangerous.
- Some models can be strapped to the head using a system of mesh and straps,
- but the **headgear** is difficult to manage with arthritic hands, and
- if you are on oxygen, it can make it nearly impossible to wear.



SPIRITUAL DARKNESS

- While these advanced "Night Vision" devices may aid our physical sight in the dark, can they truly guide us through the spiritual darkness?
- Indeed, the answer to that question is a resounding no.
- Nevertheless, spiritual darkness is a real problem, and most Christians have great difficulty in their spiritual discernment because their maturity level is too low to help them.
- The reason why their maturity level is <u>stunted</u> is because their model of spiritual growth needs work.



SPIRITUAL DULLNESS

- The spiritual man (pneumatikos) makes judgments about all things, but he himself is not subject to any man's judgment: (1 Cor. 2:15)
- "For who has known the mind of the Lord that he may instruct him?" [Isaiah 40:13] (1 Cor. 2:16a)
- But we have the mind of Christ. (1 Cor. 2:16b)
- Brothers, I could not address you as spiritual (pneumatikos) but as worldly (sarkikos) — mere infants in Christ. I gave you milk, not solid food, for you were not yet ready for it. Indeed, you are still not ready. (1 Cor. 3:1-2)



SPIRITUAL DULLNESS

- We have much to say about this [Jesus as our new High Priest], but it is hard to explain because you are slow to learn. (Heb. 5:11)
- ✤ In fact, ...
- though by this time, you ought to be teachers;
- [unfortunately] you need someone to teach you the elementary truths of God's word all over again. (Heb. 5:12a)
- You need milk, not solid food! (Heb. 5:12b)



SPIRITUAL DULLNESS

- Anyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness (right from wrong). (Heb. 5:13)
- But solid food is for the mature, who, by constant use, have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil. (Heb. 5:14)
- Therefore let us leave the elementary teachings about Christ and go on to maturity, ... (Heb. 6:1)
- And **God** permitting, we will do so. (Heb. 6:3)



SPIRITUAL DULLNESS

- It's noteworthy that the issue of spiritual maturity was a common challenge in both the Corinthian and Hebrew churches.
- Too many professing Christians in the church lacked the "mind of Christ" and the ability to keep themselves in God's good, pleasing, and perfect will, which is crucial for maturity and spiritual growth.
- * This was a **significant problem** as ...
 - ► 1) the **saints** were slow to learn the **"deep things"** of God, and
 - 2) they were undiscerning in a world full of darkness and spiritual dangers.

CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

- When Sally and I were new Christians, we were taught a basic Evangelical model of spiritual growth.
 - ► If we, ...
 - Read our Bibles.
 - Prayed every day.
 - Went to church regularly.
 - Were a cheerful giver.
 - Shared our faith.
 - Spiritual growth would take place in our lives.

CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

- When we started Ekklesia in 1999, there was a teaching that went around like wildfire among some charismatic circles.
- It was based on the controversial Latter-Day Rain teachings of the 1940s, which taught that . . .
 - If we spend significant quantities of time and effort in ...
 - Worship,
 - Prayer, and
 - Fasting.
 - We would achieve a critical mass of Holy Ghost power, transforming us into powerful Christians capable of performing signs, wonders, and miracles.

CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

- My major problem with both approaches is that they leave out the "Great Commandment" or devalue its importance and role and don't realize that it is the ultimate means of grace.
- * The Great Commandment is as follows!
 - A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. (John 13:34)
 - Concerning a question of the greatest commandment, Jesus replied:
 - "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' (Matt. 22:37)
 - This is the **first** and **greatest** commandment. (Matt. 22:38)
 - And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' (Matt. 22:39)
 - All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." (Matt. 22:40)

CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

- The text from my first sermon at a Celebration Banquet for Ekklesia was taken from the Book of 2nd Kings.
- It was when Hilkiah, the high priest, said to Shaphan, the secretary, "I have found the Book of the Law in the temple of the LORD." (2 Kings 22:8)
- When the Book of the Law was taken to King Josiah, the king said,
 - Great is the LORD's anger that <u>burns against us</u> because
 - our fathers have <u>not</u> obeyed the words of this book;
 - they have not acted in accordance with all that is written there concerning us." (2 Kings 22:13)



CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

- I used the story of finding the "Book of the Law" because many things in God's Word need to be rediscovered—especially when they are emphasized over and over again in the Bible—especially the New Testament.
- For instance,
- One-third to one-half of all the epistles written by the Apostle Paul emphasize the need to perfect our near-neighbor, one-on-one personal relationships, especially those in the church.
- In fact, Chapter 13 of 1st Corinthians says that without love, we are obnoxious and gain nothing in serving God —even if we become martyrs.



CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

So then, what should we do?

- Be imitators of God, therefore, as dearly loved children and live a life of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God. (Eph. 5:1-2) [See also, Ephesian 5:3-7]
- Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God, but if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is made complete in us. (1 John 4:11-12)
- God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in him.
 - In this way, love is made <u>complete</u> among us so that we will have confidence on the day of judgment
 - because in this world we are like him. (1 John 4:16-17)

SUMMARY

- When we walk with "self-sacrificing" love, we imitate God and attract the transformational presence of the Holy Spirit into our lives.
- This presence works not on the outside but on the innermost regions of our hearts.
- It's a sanctifying process that starts from within, radiating outwards, filling us with more love for people, joy, peace, and the rest of the fruit of the Spirit.
- So when we call upon the name of the Lord, God says here am I, as we abide in Christ, and He abides in us. [See John 15:1-17]



SUMMARY

- Again, when we walk in love, we abide in Christ and mature in the Lord.
- We also obtain the "Mind of Christ" and discern all things so that we can keep ourselves in God's good, pleasing, and perfect will.
- * Why is **this** important?
- In the "last days," there will be much spiritual darkness, leading to the emergence of "false teachers" and "false prophets" who will exploit the saints—especially those who do not obey God's commandments.



SUMMARY

- So then, we must keep ourselves in God's love.
- We then need to ensure that our vision is good and we can see well, even in the darkness.
- ✤ As the Apostle Paul says,
- But you, brothers, are not in darkness, so this day should surprise you like a thief. You are all sons of the light and sons of the day. (1 Th. 5:4-5)
- In other words, if we walk in the light, as he is in the light (1 John 1:7), our **fellowship with God** will be a **lamp** for our feet no matter how **bad** things get.
- So, let us put on our "Night Vision" goggles so that the darkness of this present age will not blind us to the faithfulness and goodness of our God and Savior, Jesus Christ.



SUMMARY

- So, how do we put on love since it is a means of grace to stand firm in the Lord?
 - Do unto others what you would want others to do to you.
- Pray for your enemies.
- Let go of any **supposed rights** you may have for **revenge**.
- Go out of your way to be nice, considerate, and helpful to others in need.
- Be a generous and cheerful **giver**.
- Overlook offenses.

FINAL WORD

- * "And there will be signs in the sun and moon and stars, and on the earth distress of nations in perplexity because of the roaring of the sea and the waves, people fainting with fear and with foreboding of what is coming on the world. For the powers of the heavens will be shaken." (Luke 21:25-26 ESVi)
- But you, brothers, are <u>not</u> in **darkness**, so this **day** should surprise you like a **thief**. (1 Th. 5:4)
- So then, let us not be like others who are asleep, but let us be alert and self-controlled. (1 Th. 5:6)
- For God did <u>not</u> appoint us to suffer wrath but to receive salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Th. 5:9)



FINAL WORD

The **day of the Lord** is a day of **darkness** and **gloom**, a day of **clouds** and **blackness**. (Joel 2:2)

The **day of the LORD** is great; it is dreadful. <u>Who can endure it?</u> (Joel 2:11)
