Scripture

- And we also thank **God** continually because,
 - when you received the word of God, which you heard from us,
 - you accepted it not as the word of men,
 - but as it actually is, the word of God,
 - ▶ which is at work in **you** who **believe**. (1 Th. 2:13)

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Scripture

- For you, brothers,
 - became imitators of God's churches in Judea, which are in Christ Jesus:
 - You suffered from your own countrymen the same things those churches <u>suffered</u> from the Jews, (1 Th. 2:14)
 - who **killed** the **Lord Jesus** and the **prophets** and also <u>drove us out</u>. (1 Th. 2:15a)

Scripture

- ❖ They displease God and are hostile to all men
 - in their effort to keep us from speaking to the Gentiles
 - ▶ so that they may be saved. (1 Th. 2:15b)
- In this way,
 - they always heap up their sins to the limit. (1 Th. 2:16a)
- The wrath of God has come upon them at last. (1 Th. 2:16b)

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Scripture

- When did this happen?
 - [After this, Paul left Athens and went to Corinth. There, he met a Jew named Aquila, a native of Pontus, who had recently come from Italy with his wife Priscilla because Claudius had ordered all Jews to leave Rome.] (Acts 18:1-2)
 - A brief statement in **Divus Claudius 25** mentions <u>agitations</u> by the "**Jews**," which led **Claudius** (Roman Emperor from AD 41 to 54) to expel them from Rome:
 - "Since the Jews constantly made disturbances at the instigation of Chrestus, he [the Emperor Claudius] expelled them from Rome."

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Scripture

- But, brothers.
 - when we were torn away from you for a short time (in person, not in thought),
 - out of our intense longing, we made every effort to see you.
 (1 Th. 2:17)
- ❖ For we wanted to come to you certainly I, Paul, did, again and again but Satan stopped us. (1 Th. 2:18)
- For what is our hope, our joy, or the crown in which we will glory in the presence of our Lord Jesus when he comes? Is it not you? (1 Th. 2:19)
- ❖ Indeed, you are our glory and joy. (1 Th. 2:20)

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Scripture

- How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy we have in the presence of our God because of you? (1 Th. 3:9)
- Night and day, we pray most earnestly that
 - we may see you again and
 - supply what is lacking in your **faith**. (1 Th. 3:10)
- ❖ Now, may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus clear the way for us to come to you. (1 Th. 3:11)

Scripture

- ❖ May the **Lord** make your **love** ...
 - increase and overflow for each other and for everyone else,
 - ▶ just as **ours** does for you. (1 Th. 3:12)
- ❖ May he strengthen your hearts so that you will be
 - blameless and holy in the presence of our God and Father
 - when our Lord Jesus comes with all his holy ones. (1 Th. 3:13)

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Scripture

- So when we could stand it no longer, we thought it best to be left by ourselves in Athens. (1 Th. 3:1)
- We sent Timothy, who is our brother and God's fellow worker in spreading the gospel of Christ,
 - to strengthen and encourage you in your faith (1 Th. 3:2)
 - so that no one would be <u>unsettled</u> by these trials.
 (1 Th. 3:3a)
- You know quite well that we were destined for them. (1 Th. 3:3b)

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Scripture

- ❖ In fact, when we were with you,
 - we kept telling you that we would be persecuted.
 - And it **turned out** that way, as you well know. (1 Th. 3:4)
- For this reason, when I could stand it no longer, I sent to find out about your faith. (1 Th. 3:5a)
- ♦ I was <u>afraid</u> that in some way ...
 - ▶ the tempter might have tempted you, and
 - our efforts might have been useless. (1 Th. 3:5b)

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Scripture

- But Timothy has just now come to us from you and has brought good news about your faith and love. (1 Th. 3:6a)
- He has told us that you always have pleasant memories of us and that you long to see us, just as we also long to see you. (1 Th. 3:6b)
- Therefore, brothers, in all our distress and persecution, we were encouraged by you because of your faith. (1 Th. 3:7)
- ❖ For now, ...
 - we really live
 - since you are **standing firm** in the Lord. (1 Th. 3:8)

Introduction

- Experienced hikers know there is one rule of the trail you don't break:
 - Do not take shortcuts.
- * Nevertheless, not all **shortcuts** are created equal.
- Some simply cut the corner off a 180°, so what's the problem?
- The problem is that if you take short shortcuts, you might become accustomed to taking <u>longer</u> <u>ones</u>.
- Then, you discover that you're on the wrong trail, separated from your hiking companions, and lost



Introduction

- One of the big truths of the Bible is that "small sins lead to larger sins."
- t's a version of the 'domino theory,' a concept that may have lost its shine in some circles, but it's a guiding principle in matters of ethics.
- It's worth noting that national and state parks invest significant resources in crafting paths that
 - ▶ not only guide hikers
- but also shield them from potential dangers and the risk of getting lost.
- Nevertheless, many people ignore these warnings.



Introduction

- I often ride my bike on the Brighton Rail Trail, which was once the C&O passenger rail line from Lexington to Washington, D.C.
- The tracks are now gone and replaced with concrete pavement.
- However, along this **path**, you see something <u>very strange</u>.
- People have carved dirt paths off into the woods, and no one knows where these paths lead.

Desired Paths

- ❖ The Bible is all over the idea of paths the good ones and the bad ones.
- In fact, just in the Wisdom Literature, there are 207 verses that refer to paths.
 - Youths oppress my people; women rule over them. O my people, your guides lead you astray; they turn you from the path. (Isaiah 3:12)
 - Make level paths for your feet and take only ways that are firm. (Proverbs 4:26)

- Make me know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. (Psalm 25:6)
- Oh, the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable his judgments and his paths beyond tracing out! (Romans 11:33)
- This is what the LORD says: "Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls. But you said, "We will not walk in it." (Jeremiah 6:16)

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Desired Paths

- ▶ Blessed are all who fear the LORD, who walk in his ways. (Psalm 128:1)
- Her ways are pleasant ways, and all her paths are peace. (Proverbs 3:17)
- ▶ I guide you in the way of wisdom and lead you along **straight paths**. (Proverbs 4:11)
- In the way of righteousness, there is life; along that path is immortality. (Proverbs 12:28)
- The man of integrity walks securely, but he who takes crooked paths will be found out. (Proverbs 10:9)
- ► I walk in the way of righteousness, along the **paths** of justice, (Proverbs 8:20)
- A voice of one calling: "In the desert, prepare the way for the LORD; make straight in the wilderness a highway for our God. (Isaiah 40:3)
- A man who <u>strays</u> from the **path** of understanding comes to rest in the company of the **dead**. (Proverbs 21:16)

Desired Paths

- ❖ The Bible strongly emphasizes the importance of choosing—desiring, if you will—the right path.
- There are right paths and paths that are not so right.
- There are good choices and not-so-good choices.
- Ultimately, it's our decisions, both good and bad, that shape our journey.
- We have the **power** to steer our lives in the direction we **desire**.
- But if what we want is bad, we will always go down the wrong path.

Desired Paths

- In today's reading from Paul's first letter to the church in the city of what we now call Thessaloniki, we find a message that is as relevant today as it was in ancient times.
- Paul's idea of what makes for good paths is a question we all grapple with.
- What path should we pursue that will give us the best chance of reaching our desired destination?



The Path of Faith

- * Paul writes.
 - "But Timothy has just now come to us from you and has brought us the good news of your faith" (3:6).
- ❖ Later in the same reading, he adds,
 - "Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you face to face and restore whatever is lacking in your faith" (3:10).
- The Thessalonians' faith was praiseworthy, yet the Apostle Paul wanted to make it even better.
- So then, what does it mean to walk on the path of growing more faith?



The Path of Faith

- Faith is the confidence we have in a person, group, or thing. It can also be based on our having confidence in ourselves.
- So, if we have confidence in God and believe he has the power to do what he has promised, then we are well on our way to having faith—especially when we put it into action.
- Jesus performed numerous miracles, not as mere displays of power but as evidence that he could be trusted and was speaking on God's behalf.



The Path of Faith

- ❖ The writer of Hebrews says it like this,
 - Now faith is the substance of (or response to) things hoped for, the evidence of things not [yet] seen. (Hebrews 11:1 KJV)
- Another way, one may say this,
 - Faith is our response to things we expect to see in the future.
 - Or, faith is the substance of what we do when God speaks, instructs, or warns.

The Path of Faith

- ❖ Therefore, what was the **substance** of the **faith** of the Thessalonians?
- Was it their
 - > Turning from idols to serve the living God.
 - Loyalty to the faith despite severe persecution, especially when cut off from all apostolic support.
- Ministering in love for one another in a chaotic period of the church's life.
- Or all of the above.
- What was so remarkable about the Thessalonians Church is that they stayed on the path of faith despite <u>trouble</u>, <u>trials</u>, and persecutions.

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The Path of Faith

- Faith enables us to persevere in the face of trials, to find hope in the midst of despair, and to experience joy even in the midst of sorrow.
- . By faith, Paul could write to the Corinthians,
 - "We are <u>afflicted</u> in every way, but <u>not</u> crushed; perplexed, but <u>not</u> driven to despair; persecuted, but <u>not</u> forsaken; <u>struck down</u>, but <u>not</u> destroyed" (2 Corinthians 4:8-9).
- Getting knocked down but not knocked out and getting up again takes perseverance, which comes from sincere faith.



The Path of Faith

- The Bible is full of people who, with sincere faith, persevered under trials.
- They are called the "great cloud of witnesses."
- ❖ Their names include ...
 - ▶ Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham,
 - ▶ Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses,
 - ▶ Rahab, Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah,
 - ▶ David, Samuel, and the prophets.



The Path of Faith

- * Again, what did all these **people** have in common?
 - All these people were still living by faith when they died. In other words, they persevered to the end.
 - ▶ They did not receive the things **promised**; they only
 - · saw them and
 - welcomed them from a distance.
 - And they admitted that they were aliens and strangers on earth. (Hebrews 11:13)
 - Again, they persevered to the end of their lives because they were looking for something beyond this present age.

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The Path of Faith

- People who say (or feel) such things show that they are looking for a country of their own. (Hebrews 11:14a)
- If they had been thinking of the country they had left, they would have had an opportunity to return. (Hebrews 11:14b)
- ❖ Instead, they actively longed for a better country — a heavenly one. (Hebrews 11:15)
- Therefore.
 - God is not ashamed to be called their God, for
 - ▶ he has <u>prepared</u> a **city** for them. (Hebrews 11:16)



The Path of Faith

- No wonder the writer of Hebrews says,
 - Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses,
 - let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles and
 - let us <u>run</u> with **perseverance** the **race** marked out for us. (Hebrews 12:1)
- So then, how do we do this?
 - Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author, and perfecter of our faith, who, for the joy set before him,
 - endured the cross, scorning its shame, and
 - sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.
 (Hebrews 12:2)



The Path of Faith

- So, how do we fix our eyes on Jesus?
- Do we get all mystical and picture Jesus in our minds as our boyfriend or our best friend?
- Or do we do the following?
 - Consider him who endured such opposition from sinful men so that you will not grow weary and lose heart. (Hebrews 12:3)
- In other words,
 - we should consider how Jesus always persevered under trials and hardship, never quitting or giving up.
- Therefore, [let us] strengthen [our] feeble arms and weak knees. (see Hebrews 12:12) and persevere by keeping on the path of faith.

The Path of Faith

- The point of the matter is this:
 - the Church at Thessalonica didn't just persevere under persecution but flourished in it,
 - they faithfully followed the Lord in everything and did so without any apostolic support.
- ❖ Why?
 - ...because, when [they] received the word of God, which [they] heard from Paul, [they] accepted it not as the word of men but as it actually is, the word of God, which is at work in [those] who believe. (1 Thessalonians 2:13)

The Path of Faith

- They took the path of faith:
 - [They] became a model to all the believers in Macedonia and Achaia. (1 Thessalonians 1:7)
 - [Their] faith in God [became] known everywhere.
 (1 Thessalonians 1:8)
 - They were a great source of encouragement for their founding pastor.
 - As the Apostle Paul says,
 - For now, we **really live** since you are **standing firm** in the **Lord**. (1 Thessalonians 3:8)

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The Path of Faith

- So, let us put God's word into practice
 - > when things are going well and
 - when things are not going so well.
- ❖ We must do this because ...
 - our spiritual growth and future hope are dependent on it and
 - it matters to **people** around us, as they take notice.
- Why? Nothing is more encouraging in the body of Christ than when people or a church serve God in difficult circumstances.

The Path of Faith

- As we journey in **faith**, let's <u>hold onto</u> the **truth** that our efforts are <u>not</u> in vain.
- So, let us keep on the **path of faith** and <u>not</u> veer off into the **woods**, where we can get hurt or lost.
- As the great cloud of witnesses would want us to know,
 - → God has a special place for us, and
 - we should, like Jesus, walk the path of faith, keeping our eye on the prize.
- It is worth the sacrifice.
