

SCRIPTURE

- ▶ Then **Job** replied to the **LORD**: (Job 42:1)
- "I know that **you** can do all things; no plan of **yours** can be thwarted. (Job 42:2)
- [You asked,] 'Who is this that **obscures** my counsel without knowledge?'
- Surely, I spoke of **things** I did not understand, **things** too wonderful for me to know. (Job 42:3)
- ["You said,] 'Listen now, and I will speak; I will question you, and you shall answer me.' (Job 42:4)
- My ears had heard of you, but now my eyes have seen you. (Job 42:5)
- Therefore, Ldespise myself and repent in dust and ashes." (Job 42:6)

SCRIPTURE

- After Job had prayed for his friends, the **LORD** made him **prosperous** again and gave him **twice** as much as he had before. (Job 42:10)
- All his **brothers** and **sisters** and **everyone** who had known him before **came** and **ate** with him in his house. (Job 42:11a)
- ► They comforted and consoled him over all the **trouble** the **LORD** had brought upon him, and each one **gave** him a piece of silver and a gold ring. (Job 42:11b)

SCRIPTURE

- ► The **LORD** blessed the latter part of **Job's life** more than the first. (Job 42:12a)
- ► He had ...
- · fourteen thousand sheep,
- six thousand camels,
- a thousand yoke of oxen and
- a thousand donkeys. (Job 42:12b)
- ► He also had seven sons and three daughters. (Job 42:13)

SCRIPTURE

- ► The first daughter he named **Jemimah**, the second **Keziah**, and the third **Keren-Happuch**.
- Nowhere in the land were **women** as **beautiful** as Job's daughters, and their father granted them an **inheritance** along with their brothers. (Job 42:12-15)
- After this, Job lived a hundred and forty years; he saw his children and their children to the fourth generation.
- ► And so he died, old and full of years. (Job 42:16-17)

INTRODUCTION

- It's every EV owner's nightmare. You're driving your electric vehicle, and suddenly, you lose power!
- According to one EV owner,
- "I began to lose power in the car the car was doing 45 mph and began to slow down gradually despite me pressing the acceleration pedal.
- The range shown on the battery was 10 miles. I was only 2.5 [miles away from a] supercharger at that time.
- I pulled over my car and stopped on the shoulder, afraid that if I kept going, the car might shut down in the middle of the road.
- At **night** on an un-lit road, this would <u>not</u> be good."



INTRODUCTION

- The fear that your car may run out of fuel (gas or electric) is called "range anxiety," a term first reported in the press on September 1, 1997, by Richard Aiello in the San Diego Business Journal.
- The emotion is more common among EV owners than those who drive vehicles with traditional internal combustion engines (ICEs).
- Perhaps this is because gas stations are more numerous than EV charging locations.
- ► Of course, this is rapidly changing.



INTRODUCTION

- "Range anxiety," although it's a term usually associated with EV owners, is a fear most people have experienced.
- We're out in the middle of nowhere, and suddenly, we notice that the fuel gauge is on "E"!
- In 1975, I was on my way back to the University of Kentucky from Ashland when I remembered I left my term paper at home.
- So I got off at the next exit (Morehead), floored it back home, picked up the paper, and made it to Lexington.
 Whew!



INTRODUCTION

- Just when I turned off of I-64 to go north on I-64 & I-75, the engine started sputtering and then quit.
- It was now **dark outside**; it was raining, and it was cold.
- I pulled over on the **shoulder**, and traffic was whizzing past me. I could feel the **car** move with every car that passed by me.
- Waiting for traffic to clear, I got out of my car and started walking. I was about two miles south of the Paris Pike exit.
- ▶ Just then, a **car** pulled up and offered to help.



INTRODUCTION

- I said, " Sure! " without having to think about it.
- They took me to the Paris Pike exit (Exit 113) and dropped me off at a gas station.
- It so happened that a **State Trooper** was sitting in his Police Car at the same gas station.
- It also happened that the gas station had a 5-gallon gas can handy, and when I put fuel in it, the State Policeman took me back to my car with all his lights flashing.
- The moral of the story is this: when I ran out of gas that night, something very special happened to me.
- It is as if God knew I was low on fuel and put all kinds of good people around me to prevent a problem from becoming a disaster.



JOB

- Speaking about a disaster.
- The story about Job is fascinating, deserving of our sympathy, perhaps even our pity.
- ► As described in Chapter 1 (See Job 1:13-19)
- Job lost his oxen, donkeys, sheep, servants, camels, seven sons, and three daughters.
- Then, on another **terrible day**, Job lost his **health**.
- He had **sores** and **boils** from the **top** of his head to the **soles** of his feet.




JOB

- Surprisingly, he was rather stoic about it:
- "'Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked shall I return there; the Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord."" (Job 1:21)
- His wife said to him,
- "Are you still holding on to your integrity? <u>Curse God and die!</u>" (Job 2:9)
- ► He replied,
- "You are talking like a foolish woman. Shall we accept good from God and not trouble?" (Job 2:10a)
- In all this, Job did not **sin** in what he said. (Job 2:10b)



JOB

- Still, Job was understandably confused, and he let God know about it.
- · He complained,
- · Wallowed in despair, and
- Cursed the day he was born.
- And who wouldn't?
- On top of all of this, he had to sit and listen to "so-called" friends who all implied that all of his troubles were caused by unconfessed sin.
- This continues for the next 35 chapters until the reader gets to the last five chapters of this 42-chapter book.



JOB

- Starting in Job 38:1ff,
 - God appears in a whirlwind and delivers a series of rhetorical questions that emphasize the vastness and incomprehensibility of divine wisdom and power.
- He lets Job know in no uncertain terms that Job's understanding is severely limited because,
- · among other things,
- he is a mortal and cannot see the big picture.



JOB

- ► So, God's **scolding** (chapters 38-41) begins with a **sharp rebuke**:
- "Gird up your **loins** like a man. {Stand up}
- I will **question** you, and you shall [answer] me" (Job 38:3).
- ► First question:
- "Where were **you** when I laid the **foundation of the earth**? (Job 38:4a)
- Tell me if you have understanding" (Job 38:4b).

JOB

- ▶ And then **God's onslaught** continues:
- "Who determined its measurements surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it?
- On what were its **bases** sunk, or who laid its **cornerstone** ..." (Job 38:5-6).
- ► Finally, **Job** begins to mumble an **apology**:
- "I know that **you** can do all things and that **no purpose** of yours can be thwarted" (Job 42:2).
- ► Through all of this, God never tells Job the **reason** for all his troubles, but he does tell us.
- ▶ We find it in the first **two chapters**.

WHAT JOB DIDN'T KNOW?

- One day, the angels came to present themselves before the LORD, and Satan also came with them. (Job 1:6)
- The LORD said to Satan, "Where have you come from?" (Job 1:7a)
- Satan answered the LORD.
- "From roaming through the earth and going back and forth in it." (Job 1:7a)
- Then the LORD said to Satan,
- "Have you considered my servant Job? (Job 1:8a)
- There is no one on earth like him; he is blameless and upright, a man who fears God and shuns evil." (Job 1:8b)



WHAT JOB DIDN'T KNOW?

- * "Does **Job** fear God for nothing?" Satan replied. (Job 1:9)
- "Have you not put a hedge around him, his household, and everything he has? (Job 1:10a)
- You have blessed the work of his hands so that his flocks and herds are spread throughout the land. (Job 1:10b)
- But stretch out your hand and **strike** everything he has, and he will surely **curse** you to your face." (Job 1:11)
- ► The **LORD** said to Satan,
- "Very well, then, **everything** he has is in your hands, but on the **man himself** do not lay a finger." (Job 1:12)



WHAT JOB DIDN'T KNOW?

- ► As you perhaps remember, when **Satan** left the presence of the **Lord**, all hell broke loose against **Job's** family and possessions.
- The **Sabeans** rode off with all of **Job's** oxen and donkeys.
- The Chaldeans came also and rode off with all of Job's camels.
- Out of nowhere, a **strong wind** came from the desert and destroyed the **house** where all of his sons and daughters were feasting—killing them all.
- ▶ In all this, the Bible says.
- Job did not sin by charging God with wrongdoing. (Job 1:22)

WHAT JOB DIDN'T KNOW?

- On another day, the angels came to present themselves before the LORD, and Satan also came with them to present himself before him. (Job 2:1)
- And the LORD said to Satan, "Where have you come from?" Satan answered the LORD, "From roaming through the earth and going back and forth in it." (Job 2:2)
- ► Then the **LORD** said to Satan,
- "Have you considered my servant Job?
- There is no one on **earth** like him; he is blameless and upright, a **man** who fears God and shuns evil.
- And he still maintains his integrity, though you incited me against him to ruin him without any reason." (Job 2:3)



WHAT JOB DIDN'T KNOW?

- * "Skin for skin!" Satan replied.
- "A man will give all he has for his own life. (Job 2:4)
- But stretch out your hand and **strike** his flesh and bones, and he will surely **curse** you to your face." (Job 2:5)
- The LORD said to Satan.
- "Very well, then, **he** is in your hands; but you must spare his **life**." (Job 2:6)
- So Satan went out from the presence of the LORD and afflicted Job with painful sores from the soles of his feet to the top of his head. (Job 2:7)



SO THEN WHAT IS THE POINT?

- Satan accused God of showing favoritism—giving unfair preferential treatment to one person or group at the expense of another.
- So then, to prove that he was innocent, God allowed Satan to test Job's integrity.
- What the trial revealed was not just Job's integrity but also the righteousness of God's judgment.
- Both Job and God emerged as paragons of integrity.
- Therefore, when you are facing trials and everyone around you assumes you have unconfessed sin, it might simply be that God is boasting about your faith and bragging about your character



IT'S HARD TO RUN OUT OF POWER

- As much as EV owners may fear losing power and getting stuck in the middle of the interstate at rush hour, it is not likely to happen.
- Why? Because the Navigation System of these automobiles does everything to warn us and guide us safely to our destination.
- It does this by calculating (the following) and then notifying us what to do.
- Our **speed** and the number of miles for our trip.
- The level of remaining electrical power in the batteries.
- Tire Pressure, Outside Air Temperature, and current published winds.
- The location of recharging facilities along our route.



IT'S HARD TO RUN OUT OF POWER

- If everyone is honest with themselves, our lives are full of
- trials,
- trouble,
- fears.
- · worries, and
- all kinds of anxieties—such as "range anxiety."
- All of this can cause us to ask the question,
- "Will we arrive at our desired destination?"
- However, through God's faithfulness and love, he will see us through if we don't give in to "fear and unbelief."



THE ACCUSER

- The Book of Revelation, directly mentions Satan as the accuser of the brethren.
- The great dragon was hurled down that ancient serpent called the devil, or Satan, who leads the whole world astray. (Rev. 12:9a)
- He was hurled to the **earth**, and his angels with him. (Rev. 12:9b)
- For the accuser of our **brothers**, who accuses them before our God day and night, has been hurled down. (Rev. 12:10)
- So then, if the above text is **futuristic**, what is **Satan** doing right now?
- He is accusing us before God as unworthy recipients of his grace.



THE ACCUSER

- Nevertheless, God, in his wisdom, has given us an advocate who teaches us how to be overcomers in a world that is hostile to us.
- The Holy Spirit is our Helper, Comforter, and Guide.
- The Greek word translated here as "Counselor" means "one who is called alongside" and has the idea of someone who encourages and exhorts.
- ▶ Jesus gave the Spirit as "compensation" for His absence ...
- to perform the functions toward us that He would have done
- if He had remained **personally** with us.



THE ADVOCATE

- ► In other words, just like some **EV vehicles**, the **Holy Spirit** helps us to reach our **final destination** safely and without running out of **juice**.
- This is important because we live in a world where we are constantly being tested, and life is full of trials, which can wear us down.
- Through the Holy Spirit's help and guidance, we can be overcomers.
- ► He reminds us that we are **new creatures** in **Christ** and that **we** can do all things through Christ, who gives us **strength**.

OUR VICTORY

- As the Scripture says (Rev. 12:11), they overcame him (Satan)
- by the blood of the Lamb
 - (the atonement we have in Christ) and
- · by the word of their testimony
 - (their public confession of faith, (i.e., Baptism)) {See also Romans 10:9-10}
- they did not love their lives so much as to shrink from death
- (unshakeable loyalty to Christ no matter what).



CONCLUSION

- According to the Apostle Paul,
- Now, we see things **imperfectly**, like puzzling reflections in a mirror, but then we will see everything with **perfect clarity**. (1 Cor. 13:12a NLT-SE)
- All that I know now is partial and incomplete, but then I will know everything completely, just as God now knows me completely. (1 Cor. 13:12b NLT-SE)
- According to Isaiah,
- But those who trust in the LORD will find new strength.
 They will soar high on wings like eagles. They will run and not grow weary. They will walk and not faint. (Is. 40:31 NLT-SF)



CONCLUSION

- So then, what does trusting the Lord look like?
- We wholly rely upon **God's** promises, wisdom, power, and love to **help us** in every circumstance.
- · Even though we might not understand everything,
 - we accept that **God's plans** are perfect, holy, and righteous, and
 - he works **all things** together for the good of those who love Him and are called according to His purpose (Romans 8:28).
- They do <u>not</u> **fear** trouble, drought, economic calamity or persecution, or running out of gas on **1-75**,
- for God will be their provider and
- guide them safely home to the place where they want to be.
